Keeping Open All Night.

Washington, Nov. 7.—The offices of Secretary Baker, Secretary Lansing, and the committee on public information were kept open all night tonight, with officials waiting to announce immediately any news that might come of the result of Marshal Foch's meeting with the German armistice envoys.

No Message Held Back.

Washington, Nov. 7.—Late tonight George Creel, chairman of the committee on public information, issued the following statement as the result of widely circulated reports that the cable censorship was holding up despatches which might confirm the false announcement cables today that an armistice had been signed. "Any such report is absolutely untrue. No despatch bearing upon any phase of the armistice negotiations is being stopped or even delayed in the New York office. The channel is wide open."

Envoy Reaches French Lines.

Washington, D.C., Nov. 7.—Just before midnight the American government was informed by cable from Paris that the German armistice envoys had approached the French lines and were due to arrive for their meeting with Marshal Foch between 8 and 10 o'clock tonight, Paris time.

The statement was authorized at the state department that no information had been received of the signing of the armistice terms, or even of the actual arrival of the Germans within the French lines.

No Word at 3 o'clock.

Washington, Nov. 8.—At 3 o'clock this (Friday) morning officials of the state and war departments, who were keeping an all-night vigil, still were without information indicating that German envoys had signed the armistice terms. In fact, at that hour no news, official or unofficial, had come that the envoys had passed through the French lines, where they were due between eight and ten o'clock last night, Paris time.

LONDON, Nov. 7 (12:31 p.m.)—The

British troops continued their steady advance along the whole front south of the Meuse-Condé canal, according to Marshal Haig's report. The statement reads:

"We reached Le Cappelle, south of Mauberge road, on both sides of Avesnes, and have gained the western outskirts of the town. At this the Somme River we are in the vicinity of Hammeau.

"North of the River Scarpe is in our hands, and our troops have made progress west of the town. To the left we have taken Elouges and Hennebe, and have reached the Condé-Meuse canal north of the latter village.

"The enemy's resistance stiffened somewhat during the afternoon, and considerable machine-gun resistance has been met on certain parts of the front. Some hundreds of prisoners and a number of guns, as well as an armament, have been captured.

EMPLOYMENT OF MEN IN DEFAULT UNDER THE MILITARY SERVICE ACT.

HE IS CERTIFIED THAT THE MILITARY SERVICE ACT APPLIED TO THE EMPLOYER WHO IS IN DEFAULT UNDER THE MILITARY SERVICE ACT.

AUTHORITIES TO THE EMPLOYEE IN QUESTION WERE PRODUCED FOR HIS INSPECTION AT THE TIME WHEN THE EMPLOYEE WAS TAKEN INTO HIS EMPLOYMENT, AND THAT IT WAS REASONABLY ESTABLISHED TO HIS SATISFACTION THAT THE MAN WAS NOT IN DEFAULT UNDER THE MILITARY SERVICE ACT. IT SHOULD BE CLEARLY UNDERSTOOD THAT THE CANADIAN REGISTRATION CERTIFICATES GIVEN ON JUNE 22, 1918, AT THE TIME OF GENERAL REGISTRATION, IN NO WAY DEFINE THE STATUS OF A MAN UNDER THE MILITARY SERVICE ACT.

Paris, Nov. 8.—The German envoys reached Marshal Foch's headquarters at 2 o'clock this morning. Elzberger heads the mission.

At 10 o'clock they met Marshal Foch and asked for an immediate armistice. This was refused.

Marshal Foch gave them 72 hours to accept the terms of unconditional surrender, or attacks will be renewed.

Winnipeg, Nov. 8.—Up to midnight there has been no confirmation from Paris or London of the German surrender. It is believed in Washington that it is true because that news is being held back for announcement of all details in the Allied capitals simultaneously.




